I know what it is to live in a cold climate and I take all possible care to make my living successful.

We had hardly any snow or rain this week. However the temperature registers between 20° and 30°; the river is all frozen, and we have now much of skating. It is really a pleasant sight to see people skating. Even this cold is not oppressive unless accompanied by wind which is the usual case over here.

Our next term begins 7<sup>th</sup> February, but we have to register for the subjects this week.
