My dear father,

I am in receipt of your letter dated Ahmedabad on 12th Dec 1926. So I have now been writing my letters in English and I wonder if they do anybody good. At least I am sure Champa can not make head or tail of them and other boys are away from home to derive any benefit; however I shall continue writing in English till you ask me to do otherwise.

I am glad to see that Sj Amritlal Thakkar has been elected President this time. He is a proved and trusted servant of the people and it is always desirable that one from them presides at their conferences. I have always a distrust for these sajabis. They have all almost lost the sense of duty which a true conception of monarchic society enjoys in them towards their subjects. It is a tough problem for India and Free India shall have to ask men to retire from a position where privileges may have abused as a class, as well as as individuals.

I had some fine time this week. The holidays has lessened the tension; And I moved out freely in no-house to Christmas invitation. One is soon mentioning from our Rotary Club. It is an international organization of industrialists and professionals, one of its object is to cultivate international peace and understanding by mutual contact and friendship. The foreign students of M.I.T were invited to a luncheon last Thursday. Certain of our rituals and formalities are quite interesting. Members call one another by the first name; after lunch they sing songs, and singing songs shake hands with one another. One can see how intimacy can be developed in such atmosphere. I had the good fortune of making acquaintance with one Mr Stockwell who is the vice-president of a great manufacturing firm, Bartlow Stockwell & Co. All of them were great industrialists, but very mixed with students so freely. I wish to cultivate the acquaintance of Mr Stockwell. It is all so different from India or even England, where the rich and not considerate to work upon the poor.

We had some good snow last Sunday and rains on Tuesday. Otherwise the weather continues beautiful. The sun shines so bright. The temperature hovers between 20° and 30°, and we have not still the days of extreme cold.

Seward has written to me that I shall be receiving some 300/- Dollars by the beginning of the next month. I also see that the business is rather dull. I do not want that he should be hard-pressed to find money promised by him for me. I wish that he lets me know it in Hanoi, so that I can find some work over here, and try to work my own way out.
